Historic Angerstein Pedestrian Crossing - Closure Threat

The Angerstein Crossing is a **I** pedestrian level crossing that has been in use since 1852. The railway is still in use as a single track freight route to Angerstein Wharf. It is used by a very few freight trains travelling very slowly carrying aggregate to and from the Angerstein Wharf. The pedestrian crossing is part of an important pedestrian link between Westcombe Park Station and Fairthorn Road that allows pedestrians to avoid the busy and polluted Woolwich Road. It is used every day by many local residents to access the station. It is also an important part of a relatively carfree pedestrian route from the Westcombe Park residential area to the retail parks at Charlton Riverside.

The crossing is one of only two such crossings left in London and has been listed by the Royal Borough of Greenwich as a Heritage Asset of value to local people. The crossing is described as a "Rare survival of a historic pedestrian route over a freight railway, still in regular use by residents for its original purpose - to avoid Woolwich Road - and as a route to Westcombe Park station. Railway also still in regular use for transport of aggregates around London"



Two years ago, just before Easter 2019, Network Rail suddenly announced that they intended to close the crossing. They gave less than one week's notice and held no consultation. This resulted in an outcry and in less than a week over 1,500 signatures were added to a petition against the closure. Network Rail withdrew and said they would rethink.

Two years later Network Rail wrote a letter to local residents saying they have

investigated alternatives and now intend to close the crossing on safety grounds and divert users via the very narrow pavement under the railway bridge on the Woolwich Road

A Zoom meeting was held on 17th June to explain the reasoning. About 70 concerned residents attended. Judging from the chat all were opposed to the proposed closure.

The meeting was chaired by John Moss-

Coleman (Community Relations Manager) and other representatives were Fiona Taylor (Kent Area), Gemma Kent, and Damian (Legal Department).

Network Rail have had cameras on the crossing and they produced photos showing incidents of concern. There were a couple of serious trespass incidents, not an uncommon occurrence on any railway, but local residents were less than impressed by the rest which included:

- somebody taking photographs on the crossing
- a woman carrying a buggy down the steps away from the crossing
- · a person on crutches
- young people sitting on the steps
- two people on the crossing appearing to be having a brief chat

All of these are cited by Network Rail as reasons to close the crossing. Their case is that these show vulnerable people at risk because they are distracted and not concentrating on the railway.

We have a Traffic Problem - its Official

The ongoing traffic issues within

Westcombe Park show no signs of
abating. Apart from the congestion, driver
behaviour is now making the situation even
more unpleasant and possibly dangerous.

Sarah Merrill the new Cabinet Member for Sustainability and Transport has begun meetings with groups of residents who are suffering from the increased traffic due to the combined changes to traffic routes caused by the 'Hills and Vales' low traffic scheme, the closure of the park to rush hour traffic and commuter reluctance to use public transport. Actions are being discussed that could alleviate the current issues albeit possibly on a temporary basis. She was keen to point out that she felt a borough-wide approach was needed with area working parties and most important of all, buy-in from residents.

Meetings have also been arranged with the Royal Parks and residents of West Greenwich to discuss possible actions that will alleviate the immediate issues particularly to the west of Westcombe Park. The Royal Parks have been asked to consider re-opening the Avenue for two hours in the morning rush hour (a request they will be very reluctant to grant). The Westcombe Society very much supports the closure of the Avenue in the longer term but has always been concerned about the knock on effects that the other closures would have. We feel able to support the re-opening for what we expect to be a temporary period to alleviate the issues we are experiencing.

We hope that these actions will allow Westcombe Park and the surrounding areas to return to more normal traffic conditions.



Meet 'Nannie' Cutty Sark's new Figurehead

On Friday 11th June 2021, a brand new Nannie figurehead was installed on the famous tea clipper ship, Cutty Sark.

was damaged in a storm in the late 19th century.

A new figurehead was installed in 1957



Nannie the figurehead is one of the most recognisable parts of Cutty Sark. The name 'Nannie' comes from Tam O'Shanter, a poem by Robert Burns. The poem also was the inspiration for the name of the ship, Cutty Sark. The poem tells the story of Tam the farmer, who encounters a group of witches in Alloway Kirk - including the beautiful witch Nannie. Nannie is scantily clad, dressed only in a 'cutty sark' - an archaic Scottish name for a short night-dress.

Anyone who passes by the ship can see her angry stare and the horse's tail hanging from her hand. In the poem, the witches chase Tam after he calls out to them during a dance. He makes his escape on his horse Meg, but just as he reaches safety Nannie grabs the tail of his horse and pulls it clean off. Therefore, Cutty Sark's figurehead is holding a horse's tail.

The original figurehead, created by the legendary ship's carver Frederick Hellyer,

but this figurehead has now also suffered due to environmental damage and rot so last year a new figurehead was commissioned, aiming to reflect the beauty of the original ship's designs and celebrate the art of ships' carving. Carver, Andy Peters, has been tasked with bringing the new figurehead to life.

One of only three in the UK and a leading authority on the subject of figurehead carving, Andy was inspired to enter his profession after visiting Cutty Sark as a small boy! He has since had a fascination with tall ships.

The design for the new figurehead has been based on a drawing by the Cutty Sark's original designer and builder, Hercules Linton. This was for the original design back in the 1860s. Using Linton's drawing, the aim was to produce a figure of the period, capturing the spirit of the age in which the ship was built.

Andy Peters said "An important aspect of the commission was that it provided an opportunity for the art of the ship's carver to be kept alive, ensuring that the skills inherent in the craft are not lost. It has been a pleasure to work with the team from the ship, for whom this has also been of paramount importance."

VACCINE SCAMS ALERT

Police and Trading Standards Officers have issued warnings about a scam which plays on fears and insecurities about Covid-19.

One such scam, printed under authentic-looking headings, claims to be from the NHS and offers the vaccine for a fee. BUT the vaccine *is* only available from the NHS and is free. Anyone offering a paid-for vaccine is committing a crime. The NHS will never:

- Ask you to press a button on your keypad or send a text to confirm you want the vaccine
- Ask for payment/bank account/card

details to pay for a vaccine or to confirm your eligibility for the vaccine.

- Ask for your PIN or banking password.
- Arrive unannounced at your home to administer or discuss the vaccine.
- Ask you to prove your identity by sending copies of personal documents eg passport, driving licence, bills, bank account details or pay slips.

Another similar fraud informs recipients that they can apply for "Digital Coronavirus Passports" by clicking on a link. Doing this takes you to a fake NHS website that asks for personal details and offers the 'passport', again for a fee.

Roll Up Your Sleeves!

NHS South East London are reminding residents to get vaccinated. They say, "Dear Colleagues, while over 80% of people within higher risk cohorts in South East London have already been vaccinated, we don't want anyone left behind. We are continuing to do all we can to reach those in high-risk groups who have not yet come forward for their vaccines. This month we are running several popup and walk-in sessions especially for those over 40 and/or

adults within high-risk groups to get their vaccines

PARKING PERMITS Have you renewed?

It was only recently that I checked my parking permit to find that it had expired some months ago. I was prompted to do this by some local residents who complained that they had been fined for not displaying a valid permit. One neighbour wrote to appeal against the fine but the reply took so long to arrive that she meanwhile incurred several further fines.

The council are no longer sending renewal reminders which they now claim were only sent as 'a matter of courtesy' although the website still states that the permit can be renewed up to 30 days before it expires and they 'will send a reminder'. Until recently there did not appear to have been any warning that renewals were no longer being sent out. As one indignant resident commented, "It would have been nice to

have the same courtesy to advise people that the system had changed."

Renewal is done on-line but there is also a contact centre phone number to ring if this is not possible. The website is very poorly designed and therefore frustrating to use. One reason is that hotlinks don't work, for example a link for a list of documents you may need to copy and attach in order to renew does not take you to the correct page. The 'before you start' page advises that you will need to open an account but has no link to enable this.

Once you have negotiated the website and purchased a permit the record is held on your account - no paper permit is issued. I wonder whether once the document is being held electronically a renewal reminder will be sent? -Maggie Gravelle

To THC or not to THC

Since being put on medication for seizures my doctor has told me there are always going to be side effects but I could not help but wonder whether if these particular side effects were not worse than the actual seizures themselves. As CBD has steadily appeared on every high street in the past three years I started to take a

closer look at the cannabis compound and see what its downsides were.

Cannabis has, since the dawn of agriculture been caught in the crossfire between those looking to crimi-

nalise its euphoric effects and those keen to harness its medicinal uses. The plant's very ingredients have been subjected to

different laws in the hope that what is specified as criminal can be kept at bay from what is termed useful but can both comfortably co-exist?

From the world's first pharmacopeia, listing Cannabis as a cure for over 100 ail-

ments, to Queen Victoria being prescribed it for period pains, cannabis has remained an alluring plant. In line with the 1961 UN recommendation that it should be prohibited except for research purposes, three medicines have to date been developed bringing relief, to among others, children suffering from severe forms of epilepsy.

Since peering at it under a microscope scientists have been able to tread new ground in how the brain and body are able to regulate themselves through a network of receptors. Indeed it is the ability of compounds in cannabis, chief among them CBD and THC, to mimic these processes

that allow, when ingested or smoked, to overwhelm them.

The law has always come down on the side of CBD. This is because THC exerts far more control over our receptors than does CBD, ensuring when the message is sent out to produce more dopamine it is done so by the bus load thereby causing

the high. So we have a law limiting the amount of THC that can be present in any CBD product and the FSA now forcing CBD stores to affirm in detail where their products originate and what percentages of either compound are

contained within.

But could it be that the truth is more nuanced? That CBD is more the Yin to

THC's Yang? Both are psychoactive, meaning they interfere with our central nervous system and both are mood altering albeit not to the same degree. There is also synergy between the two in that CBD only inter-

acts with receptors in the presence of THC or other cannabis compounds, leading to a catch-22 situation where the criminalisation of THC limits the use of CBD.

Given that a CBD isolate product will cost you less than a full-spectrum product that contains other cannabis compounds including THC I'm tempted to try the full spectrum. I would even consider volunteering for medical cannabis now being trialled by the NHS but clearly dosage would be a serious consideration given that this new medicine contains varying amounts of THC above what would otherwise be legally acceptable.

The Perfect Creme Caramel

The simplicity of ingredients probably accounts for crème caramel's ubiquity and the fact that it lasts so well. The Romans, were they still here, would claim provenance having made custards by the gallon - after a trend for domesticating fowl resulted in an egg surplus in the metropolis. Greece at this would look dispossessed. We would lay

claim to the syrupy dressing idea after bringing sugar back from the crusades while the Spanish and Italians would assert their ownership although the Moors, were they still here, might think differently. India would, of course, remind us that they were the first to refine sugar hence the word's origins in the Sanskrit for grit, Sakara. The French could chip in and say crème in this case means custard from the old French *croustade*.

Crème caramel, wherever it came from, is a variation on custard but unlike its nearest relation crème brûlée uses the egg whites as well as the yolks to provide both a gelatinous and creamy body but also sufficient water for the hardened caramel to then absorb and so become of a syrupy consistency.

Ingredients

For the caramel:

80g caster sugar 80g muscovado sugar 6 tbsp water

For the custard: 4 eggs

1 tsp vanilla extract



10g caster sugar 1 pint full-fat milk

Method

Pre-heat the oven to 150c and warm the ramekins in a roasting tray.

- In a very clean and preferably light-coloured saucepan gently heat the sugar and water. Do not stir. The sugar crystals have jagged edges which even after liquefying

want to regroup into a solid mass and stirring provides them with a convenient point around which they can accumulate. When the caramel is a dark brown turn off the heat and pour the liquid into the ramekins.

- Allow them to cool at room temperature. If you put them in the fridge the sugar will absorb moisture and go soft.
- Once hard, butter the sides of the ramekins above the level of the caramel.
- Gently whisk the eggs, vanilla and sugar. The less air your custard contains the smoother it will be.
- Gently heat the milk until it is just beginning to steam and then strain slowly through a sieve onto the egg mixture.
- Gently whisk together and then pour into the ramekins.
- Stand the ramekins in the roasting tray and fill half-way with boiling water.
- Cook for 1 hour or until the custard has
- Remove the ramekins and cool at room temperature. Transfer to the fridge overnight.
- To serve, place a serving dish on top of the ramekin and turn upside down.

Am I Dehydrated?




Staying hydrated is important for keeping your heart and circulatory system healthy. Thirst often feels similar to hunger, so drinking plenty of fluid can prevent over-eating and weight-gain.


Symptoms of dehydration include headaches, tiredness, irritability and difficulty concentrating. If your urine is pale and clear then you are hydrated. If your urine is more yellow, brown or dark in colour with a strong smell, you are probably not drinking enough.

Aim to drink six to eight cups or glasses of fluid every day. You may need to drink more during hot weather, or if you are doing a lot of physical activity.

Water is best, but if you don't like water, try herbal teas or sugar-free squash. Coffee and tea also count, with no sugar. You can get water from fruit and vegetables, such as cucumber, watermelon, tomatoes, oranges and apples. Avoid drinking too much alcohol as it causes you to urinate more, which can lead to dehydration.





Yaa Gyasi and Francis Spufford, two differing authors whose first novels were widely acclaimed and bestowed with prizes, have each produced their second novels. A second act is always tough but each has succeeded in producing something worth reading.

The Ghanaian-American writer Yaa Gyasi's debut novel "Homegoing", nominated for the Booker Prize, explored racial identity in a historical sweep through slavery, emancipation and emigration. Its strong theme was hampered by a flimsy structure of individual pearls of distinct, separate stories threaded unsatisfactorily together to form an imperfect necklace of a

In "Tanscendent Kingdom" (246 pages, RRP £14.99, pub Penguin Random House) racism and cultural identity are again present but here they are part of a disturbing and persistent background hum rather than forming the centre of the novel.

This change in emphasis makes the novel more enjoyable and makes the same message more powerful for being understated but ever-present.

Our heroine, Gifty, arrives from Ghana, in Huntsville Alabama, as a one of a family of four and we gradually discover why and how her immediate family shrinks to

Instead of an historical context we have flashbacks to youth and expeditions between countries as one sibling becomes too absorbed in US culture and one parent flees from it. The impact of their choices on Gifty and her mother are profound.

Raised on her mother's swaddling religion Gifty seeks answers and escape through rigorous scientific endeavour.

The novel suggest that perhaps love, and family and personal identity lie between science and religion, between Ghana and the US, between madness and sanity, and between the past and the present. Gifty needs to learn to feel as well as to think.

"Perpetual Light" (pub Faber, RRP £16.99, 327 pages) is set much closer to home. Spufford teaches writing at our local Goldsmiths College and was inspired by walking to work each day past the memorial to the 168 victims of the V-2 attack on Woolworths on New Cross Road. He imagines how the lives of five of the young victims of the bomb might have developed had the bomb not dropped.

The book becomes a social history of (South East) London with the characters imagined at five and ten year intervals through rationing, mods and rockers, skinheads and the National Front, Thatcher and Blair, Britpop and property development, and Millwall and Glyndebourne.

It's an enjoyable read but the tragic bomb blast that is its starting point is strangely irrelevant: the five victims are fictitious (although fifteen youngsters were indeed killed) and if their existence is a fiction in a novel they could equally have been five survivors. However, without that particular springboard there may have been no novel and I'm delighted that he was inspired to write it.

fter nearly a year in and out of lock-Adown, when Greenwich Theatre ran some popular online theatre, many local residents will be thrilled to know the longstanding venue has opened its doors to audiences again.

The Westcombe News were invited to see four short plays by acclaimed playwright Caryl Churchill, (Top Girls; A Number); entitled Bad Nights and Odd Days. Greenwich Theatre have added a fourth play to the season - the dystopian tale, Not Not Not Not Enough Oxygen, which featured alongside Churchill's unforgettable works, Abortive, Seagulls, and Three More Sleepless Nights.

Some of the plays were originally performed on the radio as far back as 1971, which puts Churchill's modernised vision into perspective.

Readers will surely recognise the lead actor, Paul McGann (Withnail and I; Doctor Who), who impressed particularly with bringing to life Churchill's clever, modern and ahead-of-its-time dialogue along with powerful performances throughout the night.

In fact, the entire cast was impressive: Kerrie Taylor (The Bay; Where The Heart Is), Bonnie Baddoo, Dan Gaisford, Gracy Goldman and Verna Vyas, under Artistic Director James Haddrell.

The night opens, with a dramatic, interesting and at times darkly funny, performance of Seagulls Churchill's powerful and personal allegory about losing the ability

mers it almost disappears. Not many people know that it is called Folly Pond. Old sepia photographs show that in Edwardian times it was a much larger and deeper affair, the haunt of sticklebacks, dragonflies and black, shiny stagbeetles.

Every spring Mr Maxwell, who apparently kept a fleet of children's canoes and paddleboats at Peter Pan's Pool in Beckenham, would bring some of them to Folly Pond where boys and girls would pay sixpence to paddle and drift dreamily over the sunlit surface of the pond for half an hour. Maxwell, who was an astute busi-

wooden shed on one side of the pond with a man wearing thighlength rubber waders who would take our

money and unchain one of the boats for us. Paddleboats were for little kids and we never went in those. On the wall of the shed was a clock and the man would remember the time we went out and call us in after our time was up. "Come in number seven". We always took care to be at the far end of the pond when our time was up and paddle very slowly back to the landing stage. Very naughty boys would cock a deaf ear to the man's shouts and he had been known to wade into the water and tow them back in after threatening to give

At about five o'clock the man would chain all his boats together, lock up his shed and leave them all floating in a group in the middle of the pond. One glorious evening Dicky and I were passing the pond and saw a canoe floating away from the others. Perhaps the man had missed slipping the chain through the hook on the canoe. Dicky, who was braver than me, slipped off his sandals and paddled out to it. The water was only about a foot deep. We had a lovely hour in it though we had no paddles and after abandoning it as dusk fell got into serious trouble for being late home. My bedtime was half past seven and it was now eight o'clock and why were my shoes soaking wet?

Steve Whitefield it was a lifestyle choice. A green therapy. He started planting outside his unique annex-style home in Angerstein Lane about 15 years ago. Big houses nearby dwarf this plot, even the old converted stable blocks opposite seem huge in comparison. One passer-by bought him a bench, dedicated to his wife, who had passed away suddenly and asked if it could become a feature of Steve's garden. "He and his familv visit sometimes man to sit on the bench." said the community minded Steve, who no doubt offers them refreshments.

Steve's garden opens every year in support of Greenwich & Bexley Hospice, and as I said my goodbyes to quite a gathering of locals, I thought Gertrude Jekyll would have approved of this blooming cot-

tage garden. Passing the Parterres, I could envison a scene from 100 years earlier, two crinoline ladies stopping to blush as the Russian-born, John Julian Angerstein's coach and horses drove past, bearing their owner back to his Woodlands home. -Anne Williams

Historic Angerstein Pedestrian **Crossing - Closure Threat**

....This places them at risk from being struck by a train travelling at up to 15mph. What Network Rail never explained was how this can be the case.

All trains have to stop at the stop boards either side of the crossing and then sound their horn before moving off. There is no way a train will come hurtling around the bend and catch them unawares whilst concentrating on something else. Indeed, no train can possibly be travelling at 15mph across the crossing from a standing start at the stop boards. Residents thought the Network Rail case weak and largely theoretical, with no regard to the actual cir-

On looking at the alternatives, an underpass has been ruled out because it would cost £3m and would have drainage issues. What Network Rail are proposing is to:

- clear vegetation along Farmdale Road paint the red walls
- paint a mural on the brickwork under the

bridge on Woolwich Road

The legal representative said the path over the railway is not a public right of way, as the crossing was originally provided for private use of the landowner, John Angerstein. He also constantly refused to answer questions about the comparative risk of using the crossing and using the narrow pavement under the bridge on Woolwich Road. His position was that safety on the pavement was a matter for the Highways Agency. Residents suggested that Network Rail were washing their hands of the public safety of pedestrians. Residents thought the presentation poor,

the evidence largely unconvincing, the logic faulty and the proposed alternative route unacceptable as no number of murals will make the narrow pavement next to the main road safe. It seems that the retreat two years ago was a tactical one to allow Network Rail time to put up the cameras, try to obtain supportive evidence and research the legal position.

Residents have asked for more detail about alternatives such as a footbridge, tunnel or gates to make the crossing itself

Residents are also organising a group to work together to oppose the closure or persuade Network Rail to provide a more suitable alternative than a diversion along a very narrow pavement next to a very busy

Local Councillors are also asking the Royal Borough of Greenwich to fight against closure or at least call for an alternative that will keep the pedestrian route open at the same location. Our MP, Matthew Pennycook has also written a strongly worded letter to Network Rail expressing his disappointment at their decision and asking them to answer a number of pertinent questions about their deci-

Planting Up a Station

Residents who use Westcombe Park Station will soon be seeing improvements to the plantings on the south, London-bound platform. Thameslink is planning to send in its team of landscapers to dig out tired or overgrown shrubs and rampant weeds from the beds, and rejuvenate them. They will be planting for low maintenance, but Thameslink has also been open to suggestions for shrubs that would also support pollinating insects like bees and hover flies.

In the past, the beds were weeded and replenished by a group of local gardeners, PiP! (Planting in the Pleasaunce), who also manage the small orchard in the East Greenwich Pleasaunce, with other locals chipping in when they could. Some residents donated plants, including rosa rugosa which has been a prolific source of flow-

The ULEZ is expanding - have you L checked your vehicle? From 25 October 2021, the central London Ultra Low Emission Zone (ULEZ) is expanding to create a single, larger zone up to (but not including) the North Circular Road (A406) and South Circular Road (A205).

About half of the borough will be inside the new zone. Four out of five cars already meet the ULEZ emissions standards, but we need owners of the remaining polluting cars, motorcycles, lighter vans and minibuses to take action.

So please do check your vehicle meets the ULEZ emissions standards.
