SAVE OUR TRAINS

Outcry at Southeastern's plans to slash peak-hour services on the Greenwich line from December without consulting users

OUTHEASTERN are changing their timetable on Sunday 11 December.

For Westcombe Park residents this means a reduction in morning peak Greenwich line services from 13 to 8 trains and a reduction in the evening peak Greenwich line services from 12 to 6 trains.

The gap between off-peak services will increase to 23 minutes twice an hour towards central London resulting in a very uneven service with trains running alternately 23 and 7 minutes apart.

There will be no improvement to the 10- and 20minutes gaps for the off-peak services from central London. Off-peak Charing Cross services from Blackheath will cease.

There has been no consultation, despite other operators consulting on their proposed changes and despite strong opposition to similar changes to the distribution of Charing Cross and Cannon Street services when first proposed in 2017.

Strong cross-party opposition to the changes

The peak hour service was only increased on the Greenwich line in early 2022 due to overcrowding. The Westcombe Society have long been campaigning for a return to the pre-Covid every 10 minutes "turn up and go". We also supported Blackheath residents in their fight against the loss of Charing Cross services in 2017.

Southeastern say the changes will mean: space on trains where it's needed most, a more consistent timetable throughout the day and more trains on time.

There is strong cross-party opposition to these changes from councillors and MPs from Greenwich, Lewisham and Bexley.

At a Royal Borough of Greenwich Transport Scrutiny meeting on Thursday 20 October, representatives from Southeastern, including the managing director, Steve White, were grilled for three hours.

Despite claiming a move towards a "turn up and go" service on its Metro lines, Mr White admitted that the Greenwich line through Westcombe Park and Maze Hill will suffer from the new timetable. He also apologised for the lack of consultation citing lack of time for meaningful consultation. His apologies were not well received, attendees felt they were too little too late.

Foodbank warns of 'biggest challenge yet' this winter

AS WINTER approaches Greenwich Foodbank finds itself facing its biggest challenge yet: rising foodbank use coupled with falling donations as the cost-of-living crisis bites, writes its chief executive, Jamie Ginns.

Each week, 3.5 tons of food come as 4.5 tons go out. The cost of living crisis has brought with it a cost of giving crisis. People cannot afford to support their local foodbank as they once could.

To help give you a clear sense of the current challenge, take a look at these statistics. In 2013 (our first full year of operation) we distributed 35,091 meals. In 2021 we distributed 91,602 meals. In 2022, at time of writing, we have distributed 104.778

Pre-pandemic almost 100 per cent of the food Greenwich Foodbank distributed was physically donated by members of the public, community groups and companies.

As the current economic climate takes hold we have begun to purchase food for ourselves - £9,000 of it each month.

A challenging time to say the least. But we are not without hope. Time and time again we have seen provision beyond our

expectation at just those moments when we need it most.

As we enter into this winter we do so with confidence that the Greenwich Foodbank story will continue as it has for the past 10 years, providing uninterrupted love and support for those in need in our borough. But we need your help if you are able to give it.

Parking permit purgatory: a battle to buy visitors' vouchers from the council website

NAVIGATING Greenwich Council website is like a journey down the rabbit hole into Alice's Wonderland, says resident Mary Harding.

I recently had to buy some visitors' parking vouchers from Greenwich Council, which can only be done online now that the paper permits have been scrapped. You are required to supply proof of address. Fair enough. The website offers a drop-down menu with only one relevant option to me: a council tax statement.

Unfortunately I was unable to find a current statement. I phoned the Parking Services helpline and spoke to a young man who was very polite and tried to be helpful.

He asked a colleague for advice and then told me that I could upload an alternative proof of address such as a utility bill or bank statement. But "just to be on safe side" I should upload several documents. When I pointed out that this option didn't appear on the menu, and the whole process was very unclear he said: yes we do get calls from people who are confused but we are able to help them through it.

So I off I go to collect my "several" documents, three of them "to be on the safe side". I choose council tax statement on the menu, upload a bank statement, then try to upload a second document. The website will only accept one! But, hey presto, I can nevertheless buy my set of four-hour vouchers. Buoyed by my success, I decide to buy some all-day vouchers as well so I start the process again. Despite my having chosen the visitor voucher option, the website decides I want a carer's voucher and offers me a list of options such as a letter from my GP or care manager. This time however, I know how the system works. I ignore what the website asks for, upload the same bank statement, and buy my vouchers.

The whole process is frustrating and farcical, Greenwich Council website is – in the currently popular phrase at Westminster – "not fit for purpose".

Park traffic ban permanent

A BAN on through-traffic imposed in Greenwich Park during the Covid crisis is now permanent.

Vehicles are barred from using The Avenue (pictured) as a cut-through between between King William Walk and Charlton Way. It used to be open during weekday rush hours. Similar bans have been confirmed in other outer London royal parks, including Richmond and Bushey, after trials started in August 2020 "to reduce the impact of cut-through traffic, improve the park visitor experience and open new spaces for park visitors to enjoy"

The Royal Parks charity, which looks after the royal parks, said that consultation responses from across the parks indicated that a majority of respondents supported the proposals. "With the closure of the roads, The Royal Parks will look to explore how



the space will be repurposed, engaging with local communities and park visitors on measures that help to improve the parks."

Tom Jarvis, its director of parks said: "As custodians of some of London's finest green spaces, we're delighted to announce that the successful trials to reduce cut-through traffic in our outer parks will be made permanent. The decision is a key part of ensuring The Royal Parks is delivering on its charitable objects.

'We'd like to thank all those who have been involved in the project since it was launched in July 2020, particularly those who responded to our public consultations.

"We're looking forward to engaging with our stakeholders and the local communities to see how we may repurpose the spaces available, now that certain roads are closed permanently to vehicles."

Song, prayer, care, and parquet floors

We recently printed a photo of a nun at the convent that is now Mycenae House and asked for readers' memories of that time. We were delighted to receive the reply printed below



T remember it very well with great affection, writes Catherine Purtill. I lived with my family in Vanbrugh Park and we would always go to Mass at the Convent if we were going out on a Sunday. They must have had an earlier Mass than Our Lady of Grace or St Mary's where we would normally go. This would have been in the 1950s. The nuns were very welcoming especially to children and I told one of them that I wanted to be a nun when I grew up so she gave me a copy of A Form of Catholic Action, which I still have, although I didn't become a nun.

I remember the shiny parquet floor which squeaked when I walked on it and the nuns singing in very high pitched voices at Mass and Benediction. They had a crowning of Our Lady procession which took place in their beautiful garden and there were probably other processions, maybe a Sacred Heart procession, although I don't remember them very well.

At Christmas there would be a crib in the chapel which was very impressive, I'm sure the nuns must have loved putting it together. I suspect they took great care with everything they did, particularly looking after the sick in their own homes, which was a wonderful thing to do. It was like a beautiful peaceful haven and I would love to be able to go back in time and visit it again. According to the Mycenae House website, the building is a rare example of a purposebuilt convent of the 1930s. Although it has always been architecturally and historically overshadowed by its illustrious neighbour, Woodlands (the former home of John Julius Angerstein, one of the original founders of Lloyd's underwriters), Mycenae House nevertheless has an interesting history. At the end of the First World War, Woodlands was empty and was sold to The Little Sisters of the Assumption - a Catholic Novitiate Order founded in France in 1865 - for use as a convent. The sale of land adjacent to Woodlands by the trustees of The Little Sisters paid for the building of a Novitiate House which was blessed in 1931 and opened in 1933. In 1967 the Order left Blackheath and relocated to Paddington. At this time a local historian, Cyril Fry, who lived in Mycenae Road, persuaded Greenwich Council to

acquire Woodlands and the Novitiate House and thereby protected the grounds and Novitiate House from acquisition by developers. The municipality bought and converted the House into Kidbrooke House Community Centre in 1968 to replace the original Kidbrooke House, which was in Shooters Hill Road where the Sun in the Sands roundabout is today. Kidbrooke House was demolished in order to build the roundabout. The new Kidbrooke House was renamed Mycenae House in 1994 as part of the changeover from being council-managed to being independently run by Vanbrugh Community Association.

Search for answers to a signal mystery

hope that the Westcombe News may be able to help me to solve a local mystery. I am a local historian researching the industries of Charlton.

This area was once an industrial heartland providing employment throughout south-east London. The site I am interested in is just the other side of the Blackwall Tunnel Approach from Westcombe Hill. It is now the police car compound and sits in what appears to be an old chalk pit. At the south end of the pit

area is the railway line from Blackheath emerging from its tunnel below the shops in Bramshot Avenue. There is quite a grand tunnel entrance which hardly anyone ever sees

I know that the police site replaced a factory and, as it was the first factory over the border in Charlton, I want to find out more about it.

All I have been able to find out so far is that it was the old South Eastern Railway's signalling works that opened sometime between 1860 and 1905.

There was an engineer's department there

and they had a well-known works cricket team. It closed in the 1980s.

I have been in touch with railway historians who specialise in signalling history, and ones who specialise in the South Eastern Railway. No one seems to know anything.

And so I am asking Westcombe Park people: does anyone know of people who worked there?

I'm attaching a photograph from the 1940s (thanks to Steve Hunnisett and Blitzwalkers). This shows the aftermath of a German V2 rocket hit on the works and part marymillsmmmm@aol.com

of Siebert Road. The houses shown were badly damaged by the blast. Tunnel Approach now runs on their sites.

The picture also shows the road frontage of the works - and it is a substantial factory with what look like metalworking areas and smoke stacks. Someone must know something about it.

Hopefully, the industries of Charlton will end up as a book – like the one I published on the Greenwich Riverside and the one I hope to publish soon on Deptford Creek.

'Dips' trees need felling to improve biodiversity

SOME OF the trees at Vanbrugh Pits (below), known as the Dips, need to be felled to enable other plants and wildlife to thrive

Joe Beale, of Vanbrugh Volunteers, warned that if complex habitats like Vanbrugh Pits – part of the Blackheath Site of Importance for Nature Conservation - are allowed to degrade then much of the wildlife is lost to be replaced by generalist species.

"Vanbrugh Volunteers help to ensure that work is done to maximise the space for the wildlife by rejuvenating areas to maintain a varied habitat, as well as by removing litter and creating a community event.

Examples of the wildlife that have been recorded at Vanbrugh Pits include almost half the UK total butterfly species, many species of bees and wasps and scarce lowland dry acid grassland plants.

"One key threat to the wildlife here comes from invasive plants. These, if allowed to predominate, will turn it into a much less biodiverse area. It is suggested that the Council is asked to undertake some selective tree work which would mean the removal of several small and medium-sized Holm Oak, Turkey Oak and ornamental cherry that are encroaching onto the open and scrub areas. These three species are fast-spreading and notoriously poor for wildlife, particularly the non-native Holm

Lime Bikes on the streets of Westcombe Park: bother or benefit?



THE WESTCOMBE PARK area has seen an increase in the number of electric Lime Bikes left on the pavement, writes Maggie Gravelle

Sometimes they are neatly parked to be out of the way of pedestrians; others cause an obstruction, and are a danger to those with limited vision or on mobility scooters.

People with children, buggies, shopping or luggage trolleys may find it very difficult to navigate around them.

Riders download an app on to their mobile phone which identifies the location of the nearest bike, or scooter, and whether it is charged.

They can then reserve the bike, submit

Bikes without any remaining charge are shown on the app, collected by Lime Bikes to be re-charged and given a roadworthiness check.

The so-called Boris bikes, which are pedal-cycles, have to be left at docking stations. Lime Bikes are meant to be left at designated parking spots, but many aren't. There are some areas, such as Greenwich Park, where parking is not permitted, although this regulation is not always observed.

One enthusiastic local rider told us how convenient the bikes were for his daily commute to North Greenwich, a journey which takes about 20 minutes by bus but less than half that time by bike. He pointed out that they were environmentally friendly and "reduced the burden on the public transport infrastructure"

One can report illegally parked or abandoned bikes apps.apple.com/gb/app/ lime-ridegreen, but ultimately the system relies on the responsibility of all road users to use and park their bikes in a considerate manner and on the Lime Bike company to remove illegally parked bikes quickly.




