Low Traffic Neighbourhood **Proposals for Westcombe Park**

Some Westcombe Park residents may be unaware that the Royal Borough of Greenwich is proposing establishing a Low Traffic Neighbourhood (LTN) in our area, along with one for West Greenwich.

The areas affected are: Westcombe Park and part of East Greenwich - between Maze Hill, the A2, the A102 (Blackwall Tunnel approach), and Woolwich Road. West Greenwich - between Crooms Hill, the A2, Greenwich South Street and Greenwich High Road. Traffic restrictions are proposed in these areas all day, every day, including weekends.

The Proposals

The project (entitled West and East Greenwich neighbourhood management project, stage 2 consultation) is intended to reduce traffic on both sides of Greenwich Park to create a safer, greener transport network. A previous scheme trialled in West Greenwich in 2020-22 led to severe congestion and increased pollution on some residential roads in Westcombe Park.

Five options have been offered for comment - three to the west and two to the east of the Park. In West Greenwich two options could, in effect, resurrect the previous LTN. An alternative option offered is a simpler scheme

at crucial junctions along the A2 to prevent cut-throughs. All options are likely to have a knock-on effect on Westcombe Park. The proposals for Westcombe

Park/East Greenwich are complex. For Option A, the area is divided into eight zones with cameras on Maze Hill, Vanbrugh Hill, Halstow Road and Westcombe Hill restricting north-south traffic. Cameras are also proposed for Vanbrugh Terrace and St Johns Park to prevent through traffic on those roads.

Option B would involve one-way traffic on Vanbrugh Hill (northbound only), Westcombe Hill (southbound only) and St Johns Park (westbound only), cameras on Maze Hill and Halstow Road to preventing north-south traffic plus exit only from Westcombe Park Road to Vanbrugh Hill. For both options roads would remain open for TfL buses (in both directions), emergency vehicles, taxis, refuse lorries and local residents with blue badges. Implications: Three scenarios below

options: **Option A:**

Humber Road to Sainsbury's: would mean going via Blackheath Standard and then through residential streets in Charlton, if they remain open, or via the A2 and the motorway to the Angerstein gyratory/Woolwich Road.

compare the two East Greenwich

Annandale Road to the Standard: would mean going via the Woolwich Road, motorway and Sun in the Sands roundabout. Foyle Road to Greenwich Town Centre (assuming LTN Option A or B for West Greenwich) would mean going via the A2 and then either the motorway and Woolwich Road or Blackheath Hill and Greenwich South Street.

Option B:

Humber Road to Sainsbury's: would mean going down Vanbrugh Hill, along the Woolwich Road and back via Westcombe Hill. Annandale Road to the Standard: would mean going via the Woolwich Road, Angerstein gyratory and up Westcombe Hill then back via Vanbrugh Hill. Foyle Road to Greenwich Town Centre (assuming LTN option A or B for West Greenwich) would mean going out via Vanbrugh Hill and

reenwich Park as we know it Gtoday is full of trees. It appears from the accounts of Sir William Boreman however, that when Charles II ordered it to be emparked, it was likely to have




Photo: The Royal Parks been largely heath, scrub and gorse. Sir William's accounts, held in the National Archives at Kew make very interesting reading [National Archive reference E351/3428]. They include payments to John Hull and John Woodruff 'for grubbing up the furze' and to Ralph Marr for staking, 'at 23d per diem' – far more than a normal wage for a labourer at that time, so this presumably includes wages to their assistants in clearing away the scrub. Following this are payments for 'Birches, Elmes and Sirkamores at 6s per 100... from Leezen Abby' [presumably Lesnes Abbey] and payments to 'Toby Rosse and several others imployed in taking up Chestnutt trees at Leezen Abby for the planting... at 5d per diem' and to Roger Horton and sundry others for '36 dayes works...

imployed in taking up trees and quicks at Kidbrooke for the planting... at 18d per diem.' Digging out saplings from nearby woods and transporting them to Greenwich was clearly a major task - William Willby, Thomas Swift and John Fisher got paid 'fore fetching of trees from Leezen Abby at 12d per load... Eltham and other places 7d per load... loads of earth to put about the rootes at 6d per load... with their foure teams about the trees and ascents.'

Far too many organisations and

local authorities nowadays boast their green credentials, based purely on the number of trees they have planted, without their having made any arrangements for maintaining and watering them until they are well-established. It is therefore worth noting that, in Charles II's time, payment was made to 'the sayd John Smyth and Richard Nightingale for digging of hollow places to receive the water about the rootes of the sayd... trees at 4d per 100' and 'for two water carts to water the trees, with two great barrells to carry the water in' and 'for two horses bought to draw the watering carts 11s 10d.' There were several conduits in the lower part of the park at that time, but getting a cart with a great barrel-full up the hill must have been hard work for those horses.

All in all, the works organized by Sir William Boreman in 1664 seem to have cost £443 18s. Even by 17th Century standards this does not seem to be an enormous price to pay for making the park what it is today.

Knife Crime in our borough a tragic reality -Council launches 'Let's Live #KnifeFree' campaign **Polly Morgan**

n response to a concerning surge Lin knife-related offenses − 1,197 in the last three years - the Royal Borough of Greenwich launched the 'Let's Live #KnifeFree' campaign in September. This alarming statistic translates to one life lost every eight weeks, with 12 tragic deaths in just the past two years. The Council collaborated with community members, youth, and the police to develop this initiative. At its core is the short film 'Big Dreams,' a compelling portrayal of a local teenager brimming with potential. The film aims to inspire both young people and adults to value the potential of a life yet to be lived.

The film is part of an outdoor and digital advertising campaign promoting the #KnifeFree lifestyle. All campaign content directs viewers to a web page offering local opportunities, including apprenticeships, career advice, guidance on safely surrendering knives, and information about safe spaces. Cllr Anthony Okereke, Leader of the Royal Borough of Greenwich, emphasizes the campaign's vital role as a lifeline for the community, underscoring the collaborative

effort to combat knife crime. Cllr Ann-Marie Cousins addresses a dangerous misconception, dispelling the belief that carrying a knife is normal and highlighting the lifealtering consequences, including imprisonment.

Hawa Haragakiza, mother of Tamim Ian Habimana, who tragically lost his life to a stabbing in 2021 at age 15, wholeheartedly supports the campaign and its mission to prevent further tragedies. The 'Big Dreams' film, a creation of the creative agency Nice and Serious following workshops with young people and community groups, stands at the forefront of this movement.

and Woolwich Road and back via Woolwich Road, the Angerstein gyratory and Westcombe Hill or via the A2 as with option A. More details of the consultation are on https://consultations.royal greenwich.gov.uk/KMS/dmart.aspx At the time of going to press the consultation deadline was 29th September 2023.

Depending on which scheme is selected the Council is also suggesting that there could be some 'complementary' measures which could 'provide added benefits'.

The Westcombe Society Response
Time does not allow the
Westcombe Society to consult all
residents. The Westcombe Society
response is agreed by the
Westcombe Society Executive and
Environment Committee based on
study of the online responses to the
consultation and discussion with a
number of local residents. The
view of the Westcombe Society at
the time of going to press is that:
Neither option is acceptable in its
current form.

24h restrictions are unnecessary. The Council's own traffic surveys show that most traffic is 'through traffic' during peak hours. Solutions should therefore focus on peak hours.

Displaced traffic will adversely affect residential streets. No plan is in place as to where displaced traffic will go. Traffic will likely increase on Blackheath Hill (A2) and Woolwich Road which the Council have already identified as disadvantaged residential areas with unacceptable levels of pollution. Displaced traffic may also emerge on other roads e.g. Eastcombe Avenue, Victoria Way and Charlton Church Lane. If Option B is implemented, it seems likely that Humber Road will also see an increase in traffic.

Longer journeys, more congestion and more pollution. Should residents be exempt? The biggest problem is through traffic. Local residents will be inconvenienced by having to make convoluted journeys, often onto major roads, increasing congestion and pollution from idling engines and increased fossil fuel consumption, tyre wear etc. Consideration should be given to exemptions for local residents similar to those used in some other boroughs.

No additional public transport.

Westcombe Park has steep hills and lacks direct public transport between many areas and the shops/amenities on the Greenwich Peninsula. Without improved bus services, residents may have no choice but to continue to use cars to access these facilities.

While we support actions that make walking and cycling safer, and accept that solutions are not easy to find, we consider the current proposals overly burdensome, especially 24h restrictions, and urge a more strategic and holistic view over a wider area.

The Westcombe Society requested an extension to the consultation given that the consultation was too late for inclusion in the September edition of the Westcombe News, took place partly during the summer holidays, was misleading and easily overlooked as no mention was made to Westcombe Park, or traffic, or LTN and included maps that are very difficult to read.



The Inventor who lived in Westcombe Park: John Taylor Beale Mary Mills

n the heart of Westcombe Park **■**Road, among the elegant 19th-century houses, lies a hidden gem of history - the story of John Taylor Beale, a local inventor, and bicycle manufacturer. John Beale's roots traced back to his father, Joshua Taylor Beale, a renowned engineer and inventor. Joshua's Greenwich Peninsula foundry was a hub of innovation, birthing creations like the 'naphtha lamp' and a ground-breaking rotary steam engine. However, his most


significant achievement was the

'exhauster', a device pivotal in gas



works and subsequent innovations. In 1866, Joshua passed away, leaving his legacy to his son, John. John took a bold step by not renewing the lease on the Greenwich factory. Instead, he redesigned the exhauster, securing a new patent in his name, which he later sold to Brian Donkin Co. of Bermondsey, a company that would eventually relocate to Chesterfield in 1903. Delving into the Derbyshire Record Office's archives, one uncovers letters from Benjamin Beale, John's uncle and Joshua's brother. Benjamin contested John's inheritance, alleging that John was a mere "John Jones, a workman in the factory", as he claimed Joshua had never married and couldn't have a son. Examination revealed that while banns for Joshua and Hannah's wedding were issued, they never officially married. Despite this, they lived together and raised three children. Hannah's life tragically ended in 1843, possibly by suicide.

The court, however, dismissed Benjamin's claim that John couldn't be Joshua's son, resulting in a compromise. Benjamin sold the original exhauster patent to



Gwynne's, a pump maker in Hammersmith and Blackfriars. John chose to remain in Greenwich, carrying forth on his father's inventive legacy. In 1878, he patented the 'Facile' bicycle, a safer alternative to the 'penny farthing.' Initially it was produced at 32 Greenwich High Road by Beale and Straw, later at Ellis & Co. in Fleet Street and Farringdon Road. To promote it, the South London Facile Club was formed, and in 1880, W. Snook completed a remarkable 24-hour road race from Land's End to John o' Groats on a 42-inch front wheel. In Westcombe Park Road, John had a circular test track for his bicycles, now transformed into flower beds. Besides bicycles, John invented a 'magic lantern picture apparatus, registered as a 'useful design' in April 1875. His address, 'Conduit House, East Greenwich,' confirmed his authorship. This device projected a moving face using a series of sixteen pictures on a revolving disc, illuminated and displayed in various orders, known as a Choreutoscope. History occasionally muddles John

Beale's contributions with another Mr. Beale—Lionel Beale, a physician and Professor of Optics, who created a similar device. Yet, John Beale's invention played a role in the evolution of motion pictures, even if it was occasionally misattributed.

John Taylor Beale's journey in innovation concluded in 1899. His father's exhauster remained a cornerstone of the Donkin Company's output in Chesterfield, undergoing numerous redesigns and adaptations. Machines based on it were produced as late as the 1960s. Although the original works ceased operations in 1996, Chesterfield's AVK Donkin Division continues to craft 'high-performance valves and accessories for the gas supply industry', tracing their lineage back over 170 years.

In the quiet elegance of Westcombe Park Road, John Taylor Beale's story resonates with the spirit of innovation that shaped the local community. His legacy endures, a testament to the enduring impact of a local inventor who once called Westcombe Park home.

Westcombe Park resident and family embark on an exciting time travel trip

Thristine Godwin, who lives in the Westcombe Park area, has had an exciting time travel adventure with her husband and grandson that she'd like to share with Westcombe News readers. She explained: "My husband and grandson acted as beach marshals when the royal shallop and six other boats arrived, after rowing from Isleworth (19 miles on a very hot day) to deliver the latest device to measure time to the Maritime Museum."

A BBC News article on the subject explains further:

A flotilla of 15 boats, led by royal barge Jubilant, has carried the extremely precise clock from Isleworth to Greenwich in southeast London.

The unique object has been given to Royal Museums Greenwich by the National Physical Laboratory (NPL) to mark the relationship between the institutions.

The optical atomic clock uses an electronic transition frequency to tell the time.

It made an almost identical journey to one in 2002, when the first Jubilant flotilla presented a caesium atomic clock that had been rowed down the Thames.

The NPL said its latest optical

clocks were more than 100 times more accurate than earlier itera-

The clock presented to the museum, is due to go on display soon, giving the public an opportunity to learn about its role in the UK's timekeeping history.

global timekeeping: Harrison's clocks enabling precise global navigation in the 18th Century. GMT was the global time scale in the 19th, the first accurate atomic clock supporting the transition to atomic time in the 20th, and the next generation of optical atomic clocks for future satellite navigation systems in the 21st.

"This celebration reinforces NPL's close relationship with the Royal Museums Greenwich and showcases the criticality of time in our daily lives."

Friends of Mycenae Gardens AGM: supporting wildlife in the Gardens

The Friends of Mycenae Gardens are delighted to invite anyone interested in wildlife and our area to enjoy a glass of wine and a great talk at our Annual General Meeting on Monday October 30th, 6:45 pm, at the Steiner School, 90 Mycenae Road. We're particularly excited because our speaker will be Joe Beale.

Many of you will already know Joe; he's a local highly-qualified naturalist who has led great volunteer activities around the area. In the Vanbrugh Pits, his regular sessions have kept invasive species like gorse and holm oak under control, allowing a wider variety of plant life to thrive and support birds and rare insects such as the Green Hairstreak butterfly. He was a key team member for Westcombe Woodlands, where

volunteers maintain habitats for natural life. Now working full-time for the Royal Society for Protection of Birds, Joe was commissioned to do a survey of breeding birds and butterflies in Mycenae Gardens and the Dell this spring, thanks to funding from the Ward Budget scheme and the Parks and Open Spaces department. He'll be talking about what he found. The report shows that there's a greater variety of birds nesting and rearing young than you might have thought - wrens, robins, and four types of tit are all confirmed. Also there were good sightings of butterflies, despite the chilly spring. Joe found Red Admirals, a splendidly showy variety, along with Holly Blues and others. You can find the full report here: https://mycenaegardens.org.uk/ ecologist-survey-2023/. The key question is whether the Gardens and the Dell are supporting as many species as previous reports showed, and Joe will outline changes over time and how you can help wildlife to thrive. Everyone is welcome to come. As it's an AGM, there will be a little bit of business electing committee members and hearing about progress over the year as well. It's a great opportunity to join the Friends as a member, but there's no obligation to do anything other than enjoy a nice glass of wine and Joe's talk, and increase your appreciation of this much-loved space.

Dear Westcombe News, Our party members had a collective guffaw upon reading "....cyclists would have to walk their bikes through the tunnel..." in reference to the Greenwich Foot Tunnel in the article titled "Consultation On Proposals For Cycle Shuttle-Bus" (WN - September 2023). As anyone who uses the Greenwich Foot Tunnel knows, the overwhelming majority of cyclists do not dismount in the tunnel as instructed, but speed through, endangering the safety of pedestrians, and spew out abuse, and even threats of violence, to any of us mere pedestrians who dare to inform them that cycling is prohibited. We believe that cyclists should be banned completely from both Greenwich and Woolwich Foot Tunnels, especially E-Bikes (and E-scooters), which have a propensity to burst into flames, which is not exactly ideal in the confined space of a tunnel.

Cyclists should have to use Tower Bridge, the Woolwich Ferry or Thames Clipper boats to cross the River Thames, and utilize the plentiful lengths of virtually unused cycle lanes in South East London.




